Re: August 16, 1997 Meeting Of The Proposed Houston Area Blacksmiths' Association
(HABA) and the Heiner Zimmermann Workshop August 23 and 24.

HEINER ZIMMERMANN WORKSHOP

What a workshop! There was something for everyone. Heiner Zimmermann, 28 years old, conducted the two day workshop with the skill and presence of a smith with 28 years of experience. Heiner's experience as a smith is worldwide and it showed while forging, teaching design, answering workshop questions and carrying on individual conversations with just about everyone.

Alan Flashing and Heiner teamed up at the forge. Alan took on the heavy work...managing the fire, getting the iron hot and striking. It was quite obvious Alan and Heiner worked together before. They worked as a team.

During the two days Heiner demonstrated how to forge many individual architectural elements that any of us could use in our own work. He exhorted us to take these designs and to build our own designs from them...to change them to suit our needs and to expand the concepts.

Heiner and Alan forged two pieces that really showcased the way things were done before the days of power hammers. A swan that would fill your two hands and a flower the size of a soft ball were forged from a piece of one and a half inch round stock. While Alan reheated the piece and caught his breath Heiner fielded questions and filled us in with information and lore from around the world.

The workshop ended with a two hour slide show of Heiner's work and that of the family shop. I think we all came out of there thinking we could make anything.

Later on in this letter are two articles about the workshop. I hope more details about the forged elements, poker, swan and flower will emerge in future letters. For those of you who took notes at the meeting, please share them with others via this letter. We need the ideas you captured. The editor can put the words around the ideas.

MONTHLY MEETING SUMMARY

The August HABA meeting took place one week before the Heiner Zimmermann Workshop. It drew a total of 22 people, 17 members and five guests. Two of the members are new to HABA. Three forges were going during the day, two from Tudor Forge and Larry Hoff's. The project for the day was a forged heart with a clip. Howard Owen finished his and did very well. Larry Hickman got a good start on his heart and ended up with the pattern heart in the Raffle. Larry Newbern demonstrated how to forge the blown leaf and Dave Koenig finished the day welding a collar on a hardie stake.

The business meeting covered a number of topics important to the group especially the upcoming workshop. Some volunteers came foreword to help with getting things prepared. We talked about how the group would like to see some things addressed at future workshops and at future HABA meetings.

Great News! Larry Hoff agreed to act as the Treasurer for HABA...after some very skillful arm twisting by Marilyn Koenig and Lora Neumann. Many thanks from all of us to Larry for accepting. (And those of you feel your arm being twisted...take note...)

Revenues generated during the day totaled \$225, \$183 from the Raffle and \$42 from the HABA Hat. Much thanks to everyone who chipped-in and congratulations to those whose lucky number was pulled from the coffee can.

The gate on Tudor Forge got locked up about 4:30.

HANDS-ON SMITHING

A part of this month's HABA meeting was a project to forge a heart hook. Those who wanted some hands-on experience at the forge were invited to use a heart forged by Dave Koenig as a pattern. The heart was forged from a 14 inch piece of quarter inch round rod and clipped where the sections of the heart met in the middle. The clip allowed the heart to be hung as a hook. The exercise required about eight inches of the bar to be drawn out at four different locations. Two three inch sections needed to be spread.

Howard Owen and Larry Hickman accepted the challenge. Howard finished his heart and Larry ran out of time due to a late start.

Bob La Roe was able to get in some forge time too. He practiced drawing out.

Larry Hoff brought his forge again and got quickly to work on what Jesse Kirk calls a 'Texas Love Knot'. Most of us know it as a square knot. With a little guidance from Larry Newbern, Larry Hoff ended up with a pretty darn good looking knot in the middle of two pieces of rebar. Now we need to see how Larry incorporates the element into one of his projects.

Larry Newbern than found a forge that needed to be used and began to demonstrate the forging of the blown leaf. From a three quarter by quarter inch bar, Larry showed us how to make a right and left handed leaf. He sure made it look easy. Larry brought a plant stand he was in the process of making as a Show-and-Tell item. The stand used two large blown leaf scrolls as an element at the top of the stand. It is going to be stunning when completed... and another satisfied customer.

Dave Koenig finished the day by forge welding a half inch square bar collar to a one inch square bar he intends to use as a stake hardie. With some coaching from Larry Newbern the collar stuck the first time. Nothing like a little practice and coaching to get things done right!

BUSINESS MEETING

Dave Koenig got the business meeting started about 11:00.

There was the reminder to use safety glasses with side shields when forging and watching a demonstration.

There was another call for a volunteer to serve as HABA Treasurer. By the time the Raffle was in full swing, Larry Hoff agreed to accept the authority and responsibility that goes with the office.

The Heiner Zimmermann Workshop was scheduled to begin in one week. Some of the topics discussed and agreed to relative to the workshop included:

Lunch on Saturday would be BBQ provided by the BBQ Hut of Magnolia rather than sandwiches.

HABA would borrow a set of bleachers from the Langham Creek YMCA for use at Coe Forge. Charles Heathcock, Jim Wheeler, Dave Koenig and others.... would pick up the bleachers on Friday the 22nd.

Charles and Sharon Heathcock would also bring a large fan to cool the shop, tarp to provide some shade and trailer to get the bleachers.

Marilyn Koenig volunteered to welcome and sign people in for the workshop.

There was a discussion about non-smithing spouses needing to pay to accompany smithing spouses to the workshop. The group decided that spouses not involved in smithing should not pay. (This kind of discussion identifies one of the needs for HABA to become more organized. Issues like this and others need to be addressed as part of the planning process of any function. Giving everyone in the group the opportunity to input their ideas is important to get the best decision for HABA.)

The group decided to Raffle a gift certificate at today's meeting for someone to attend the Heiner Zimmermann Workshop. See the results below.

The September HABA meeting will be hosted by Larry Newbern's Brazos Forge in Needville, TX. The particulars are included below in the Next Meeting section.

There was a discussion about what the group wanted to see take place at HABA meetings. Right now the meetings could be characterized as creative and free flowing. Several things seem to take place at our meetings at the same time: people forging, informal and formal demonstrating, a table with usually a Resource, Handout, and Show-and-Tell sections, a business meeting, Camp Stew, Raffle, Pass-the-Hat and many, many small conversations going on all over.

The consensus seemed to be that HABA is doing what most people think it should be doing.

Some things HABA might consider looking at are:

Setting up a resource library for members with books, tapes (examples of iron work from workshops and demonstrations with instructions that people can take home and practice.)

Sharing this information and resources with local schools including investigating what it would take to set up classes.

Preparing a flyer to distribute via steel and blacksmith suppliers that lets people know HABA is in the process of getting started. (See an example of such a flyer below. The Flyer will be a subject for the September business meeting.)

The meeting concluded with a quick review of workshops and opportunities to demonstrate in the area.

CAMP STEW

The Camp Stew feature of our meeting was put on hold until the weather is a bit more conducive to an open fire. This week, everyone enjoyed their own lunch creations.

Larry Newbern managed to set his lunch cooler on top of, what else, a fire ant hill. In a matter of the time it takes to show someone how to create a 'Texas Love Knot' with rebar, the little devils were not only in the cooler but thick on the sandwich inside a sealed zip lock sandwich bag. Did this create any kind of problem for Larry? Noooooooooo. A few huffs and puffs and strategically placed flicks of the finger and voila...a sandwich fit for any good smith. I am not too sure about the ants that burrowed into the mayonnaise though.....
